# GRADIENT TYPE ESTIMATES FOR LINEAR ELLIPTIC SYSTEMS FROM COMPOSITE MATERIALS 

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#### Abstract

In this paper, we consider linear elliptic systems from composite materials where the coefficients depend on the shape and might have the discontinuity between the subregions. We derive a function which is related to the gradient of the weak solutions and which is not only locally piecewise Hölder continuous but locally Hölder continuous The gradient of the weak solutions can be estimated by this derived function and we also prove the local piecewise gradient Hölder continuity which was obtained by the previous results.


## 1. Introductions

In this paper, we study linear elliptic systems from composite materials. First, we describe our model problem in this paper. For composite materials, the physical characteristics of the medium are divided into a finite number of components or subregions. So let $\Omega \subset \mathbb{R}^{n}(n \geq 2)$ be a bounded domain and $\Omega_{1}, \ldots, \Omega_{l} \subset \Omega$ be the mutually disjoint subregions (of $\Omega$ ) with $\Omega_{0}:=$ $\Omega \backslash\left(\Omega_{1} \cup \cdots \cup \Omega_{l}\right)$. Here, the subregions $\Omega_{0}, \Omega_{1}, \ldots, \Omega_{l}$ represent each component of a composite material $\Omega$. Since the physical characteristics are regular in each component $\Omega_{0}, \ldots, \Omega_{l}$, we consider the following linear elliptic systems.

For $C^{1, \gamma}$-domains $\Omega_{1}, \ldots, \Omega_{l}$ and $\Omega$, let $u \in W^{1,2}\left(\Omega, \mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ be a weak solution of

for $1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n$ and $1 \leq i, j \leq N$, where

\end{equation*}

for some positive constants $\lambda$ and $\Lambda$. Because the physical characteristics are regular in each subregion $\Omega_{0}, \ldots, \Omega_{l} \subset \Omega$, we assume that $A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}, F_{\alpha}^{i} \in C^{\mu}\left(\Omega_{k}\right)$ $(k \in\{0, \ldots, l\})$ for any $1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n$ and $1 \leq i, j \leq N$. We remark that only

[^0]the interior estimates will be obtained in this paper, and one may not impose any regularity condition on the boundary data.

The regularity theory related to composite materials is motivated by the numerical observation [2] that the gradient bound $|D u|$ is independent of the distance between the subdomains for certain homogeneous isotropic linear systems of elasticity. Bonnetier and Vogelius [3] considered a geometric structure of two touching disk inside a disk to obtain a gradient boundedness of the weak solution. Then Li and Vogelius [20] obtained the global Lipschitz regularity and global piecewise gradient Hölder continuity for linear elliptic equations in general geometry, say mutually disjoint subdomains $\Omega_{1}, \ldots, \Omega_{l}$ inside the domain $\Omega$. Later, Li and Nirenberg [19] extended [20] by obtaining the local Lipschitz regularity and the local piecewise gradient Hölder continuity for linear elliptic systems. Here, "gradient piecewise Hölder continuous" means that $D u$ is Hölder continuous in each $\Omega_{k}$ for any $k \in\{0, \ldots, l\}$ and "local gradient piecewise Hölder continuous" means that $D u$ is Hölder continuous in each $\Omega_{k} \cap \Omega^{\prime}$ for any $k \in\{0, \ldots, l\}$ and $\Omega^{\prime} \subset \subset \Omega$.

In $[19,20]$, they obtained the piecewise gradient Hölder continuity in the point-wise sense by using the Schauder type approach. In this paper, we find a suitable function related to the gradient of the weak solution which is not only locally piecewise Hölder continuous but locally Hölder continuous (see Theorem 1.7). Then by using that the coefficients are Hölder continuous in each component, one can also show that the gradient of the weak solution is piecewise Hölder continuous which was already obtained in $[19,20]$ (see Corollary 1.8). The purpose for obtaining such a result is to derive a gradient type estimate which can be used for an open problem suggested by Li and Nirenberg in [19] which is related to the piecewise Hölder continuity of higher order derivatives for weak solutions to elliptic equations from composite materials. We will obtain the desired gradient Hölder type estimate by using the excess functional, say $f_{Q_{r}(z)}\left|g-(g)_{Q_{r}(z)}\right| d x$, which appears in Campanato type embeddings.

We introduce the notations in this paper. Let $y=\left(y^{1}, y^{\prime}\right) \in \mathbb{R}^{n}$ be a typical point, and $r>0$ be a size.
(1) $Q_{r}^{\prime}\left(y^{\prime}\right)=\left\{x^{\prime}=\left(x^{2}, \ldots, x^{n}\right) \in \mathbb{R}^{n-1}: \max _{2 \leq i \leq n}\left|x^{i}-y^{i}\right|<r\right\}$ is the open cube in $\mathbb{R}^{n-1}$ with center $y^{\prime}$ and size $r$. Also we denote $Q_{r}^{\prime}=$ $Q_{r}^{\prime}\left(0^{\prime}\right)$.
(2) $Q_{r}(y)=\left\{x \in \mathbb{R}^{n}: \max _{1 \leq i \leq n}\left|x^{i}-y^{i}\right|<r\right\}=\left(y^{1}-r, y^{1}+r\right) \times Q_{r}^{\prime}\left(y^{\prime}\right)$ is the open cube in $\mathbb{R}^{n}$ with center $y$ and size $r$. Also we denote $Q_{r}=Q_{r}(0)$.
(3) For a function $g(x)$ in $\mathbb{R}^{n}$,

where $U$ is an open subset in $\mathbb{R}^{n}$ and $|U|$ is the $n$-dimensional Lebesgue measure of $U$.

A typical composite material $\Omega \subset \mathbb{R}^{n}(n \geq 2)$ composed of $C^{1, \gamma}$-boundaries can be described as follows. Let $\Omega_{1} \subset \Omega$ be a connected component in $\Omega$ and $\Omega_{2}, \ldots, \Omega_{l} \subset \Omega$ be the components surrounded by $\Omega_{1}$. Without loss of generality, we may assume that $\Omega_{1} \cup \cdots \cup \Omega_{l}$ and $\Omega_{2} \cup \cdots \cup \Omega_{l}$ are open. Let $D_{2}, \ldots, D_{m} \subset \Omega$ be the disjoint open connected components of $\Omega_{2} \cup \cdots \cup \Omega_{l}$. Then for the open set $D_{1}=\Omega_{1} \cup \cdots \cup \Omega_{l}$, we have that $\Omega_{1}=D_{1} \backslash\left(D_{2} \cup \cdots \cup D_{m}\right)$. If $D_{1}, D_{2}, \ldots, D_{m}$ are $C^{1, \gamma}$-domains, then we may say that the component (or the subregion) $\Omega_{1}$ is composed of $C^{1, \gamma}$-boundaries. For this geometry, one can prove that for a sufficiently small scale, there exists a coordinate system such that the boundary of the subregions becomes a graph, see for instance [17]. For the composite geometry related to $C^{1, \gamma}$-domains, we also refer to $[19,20]$.

With the description in the previous paragraph, we may assume that the cube $Q_{r}(z)$ can be divided into the components (of the composite material) or the subregions by using $C^{1, \gamma}$-graph functions $\left\{\varphi_{k}: k \in K_{+}\right\}$. Here, $K_{+}$will be used to denote the index set of graph functions. The subregions in $Q_{r}(z)$ will be denoted as $Q_{r}^{k}(z)$ with a index set $K$. We remark that for the index of the components $K=\left\{k_{-}, k_{-}+1, \ldots, k_{+}\right\}$, there is an one more element $\left\{k_{+}+1\right\}$ in the index set of the graph functions $K_{+}=K \dot{\cup}\left\{k_{+}+1\right\}$. We also remark that there can be only one element in $K=\left\{k_{-}, k_{-}+1, \ldots, k_{+}\right\}$. In Definition 1.1, $\dot{U}_{k \in K} U_{k}$ denotes disjoint union meaning that $\dot{U}_{k \in K} U_{k}$ is the union of the sets $\left\{U_{k}: k \in K\right\}$ and that $\left\{U_{k}: k \in K\right\}$ are mutually disjoint.

Definition 1.1. We say that $\left(Q_{r}(z),\left\{\varphi_{k}: k \in K_{+}\right\}\right)$is a composite cube if the graph functions $\varphi_{k} \in C^{1, \gamma}\left(Q_{r}^{\prime}\left(z^{\prime}\right)\right)\left(k \in K_{+}\right)$with $K=\left\{k_{-}, k_{-}+1, \ldots, k_{+}\right\}$ and $K_{+}=K \dot{\cup}\left\{k_{+}+1\right\}$ satisfy that

where $Q_{r}^{k}(y):=\left\{\left(x^{1}, x^{\prime}\right) \in Q_{r}(y): \varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)<x^{1} \leq \varphi_{k+1}\left(x^{\prime}\right)\right\}(k \in K)$.
For the composite cube inside the cube, we use the following natural definition.

Definition 1.2. For the composite cube $\left(Q_{r}(z),\left\{\varphi_{k}: k \in K_{+}\right\}\right)$, we denote

Q_{\rho}^{k}(y):=\left\{\left(x^{1}, x^{\prime}\right) \in Q_{\rho}(y): \varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)<x^{1} \leq \varphi_{k+1}\left(x^{\prime}\right)\right\} \quad(k \in K)

for any $Q_{\rho}(y) \subset Q_{r}(z)$.
Remark 1.3. If $\left(Q_{r}(z),\left\{\varphi_{k}: k \in K_{+}\right\}\right)$is a composite cube, then for any $Q_{\rho}(y)$ $\subset Q_{r}(z),\left(Q_{\rho}(y),\left\{\varphi_{k}: k \in K_{+}\right\}\right)$is also a composite cube. Moreover, we have that $\inf _{Q_{r}^{\prime}\left(z^{\prime}\right)}\left|\varphi_{k_{-}}\right| \geq r$ and $\inf _{Q_{r}^{\prime}\left(z^{\prime}\right)}\left|\varphi_{k_{+}+1}\right| \geq r$ for $K=\left\{k_{-}, k_{-}+1, \ldots, k_{+}\right.$, $\left.k_{+}+1\right\}$.

To state our main theorem, we define a vector-valued function $\pi^{\prime}: Q_{r}(z) \rightarrow$ $\mathbb{R}^{n-1}$ which is naturally induced from our geometry.

Definition 1.4. For the composite cube $\left(Q_{r}(z),\left\{\varphi_{k}: k \in K\right\}\right)$, define $T_{k}$ : $Q_{r}(z) \rightarrow[0,1](k \in K)$ as

Then 'the derivative of the naturally induced flow' $\pi: Q_{r}(z) \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{n}$ is defined as

where

\pi_{\alpha}(x)=D_{\alpha} \varphi_{k+1}\left(x^{\prime}\right) \cdot T_{k}(x)+D_{\alpha} \varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right) \cdot\left[1-T_{k}(x)\right] \text { in } Q_{r}^{k}(z) \tag{1.5}
\end{equation*}

for any $k \in K$ and $\alpha \in\{2, \ldots, n\}$.
Remark 1.5. At a boundary point of subregions, say $x=\left(\varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right), x^{\prime}\right) \in Q_{r}(z)$ $(k \in K)$, we have that $\pi^{\prime}(x)=D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)$. Moreover, from the point $\left(\varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right), x^{\prime}\right)$ to the point $\left(\varphi_{k+1}\left(x^{\prime}\right), x^{\prime}\right)$, the value of $\pi^{\prime}$ changes linearly from $D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)$ to $D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k+1}\left(x^{\prime}\right)$. So the derivative of the naturally induced flow remains the same for any subset $Q_{\rho}(y) \subset Q_{r}(z)$.

Remark 1.6. In Definition 1.4, the reason for using the phrase 'the derivative of the naturally induced flow' is that for the flow $\psi: Q_{r-\epsilon}(z) \times(-\epsilon, \epsilon) \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{n}$ defined as
$\psi\left(x, t^{\prime}\right)=\left[\varphi_{k+1}\left(x^{\prime}+t^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k+1}\left(x^{\prime}\right)\right] \cdot T_{k}(x)+\left[\varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}+t^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)\right] \cdot\left[1-T_{k}(x)\right]$, we have that $\pi^{\prime}(x)=\left.\partial_{t} \psi\left(x, t^{\prime}\right)\right|_{t=0}$. In [16], the concept of the (time) derivatives of the flow will be used to solve the open problem suggested by Li, Nirenberg and Vogelius in $[19,20]$. But there are some technical difficulties related to the discontinuities and we need some additional argument for proving the piecewise smoothness for piecewise smooth coefficients, see the introduction of [16].

We assume that $A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}: \mathbb{R}^{n} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{N n} \times \mathbb{R}^{N n}(1 \leq i, j \leq N, 1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n)$ satisfy that

and

We now state the main results. In Theorem 1.7, we focus on the cube $Q_{3 R}$ and assume that the minimum of the absolute value of the graph functions are smaller than $4 R$. If the minimum of the absolute value of the graph functions such as $\varphi_{k_{-}}$and $\varphi_{k_{+}+1}$ is greater than $4 R$, then one can choose new graph
functions $\varphi_{k_{-}}$and $\varphi_{k_{+}+1}$ in the way that the regions of the composite cube remain the same. For the simplicity of the notation, we set

We also explain the constant $\mu=\frac{\gamma}{2(\gamma+1)}$ in the condition $A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}, F_{\alpha}^{i} \in C^{\mu}\left(Q_{2 R}^{k}\right)$. The main tool for handling the composite domain or the composite cube is the estimate on the non-crossing boundaries of the regions or the non-crossing graph functions, (see for instance [20, Section 5] or [19, Section 4]) which comes from that the boundary of the components in the composite materials does not cross each other. In the estimate, we lose some regularity (see Lemma 2.1) and the main equation behaves like elliptic equations with $C^{\mu}$-Hölder continuous coefficients.

Theorem 1.7. For the composite cube $\left(Q_{3 R},\left\{\varphi_{k}: k \in K_{+}\right\}\right)$, assume that

Also for $\mu$ in (1.8), assume (1.6), (1.7) and that

for any $1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n, 1 \leq i, j \leq N$ and $k \in K$. Let $u$ be a weak solution of

and define $U: Q_{2 R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{N n}$ as $U=\left(U^{1}, \ldots, U^{N}\right)^{T}$ and

for any $1 \leq i \leq N$, where $\pi: Q_{2 R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{n}$ is defined in Definition 1.4. Then we have that

& +\frac{c}{R^{2 \mu}}\left[f_{Q_{r}(z)}|U|^{2} d x+\|F\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{r}(z)\right)}^{2}+R^{2 \mu} \sup _{k \in K}[F]_{C^{\mu}\left(Q_{r}^{k}(z)\right)}^{2}\right]
\end{align*}

and

f_{Q_{\rho}(z)}|U|^{2} d x \leq c\left(f_{Q_{r}(z)}|U|^{2} d x+\|F\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{2 R}\right)}^{2}+r^{2 \mu} \sup _{k \in K}[F]_{C^{\mu}\left(Q_{r}^{k}(z)\right)}^{2}\right) \tag{1.11}
\end{equation*}

for any $z \in Q_{R}$ and $0<\rho \leq r \leq R$. Here, the constant $c$ depends on the terms $n, N, \lambda, \Lambda, \sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left\|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{3 R}^{\prime}\right)}, R^{\gamma} \sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right]_{C^{\gamma}\left(Q_{3 R}^{\prime}\right)}$, $R^{\mu} \sup _{k \in K}\left[A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}\right]_{C^{\mu}\left(Q_{2 R}^{k}\right)}$ and the number of elements in the set $K$.

We will later prove that $\pi^{\prime} \in C^{2 \mu}\left(Q_{2 R}\right)$. We will compare $D u$ and $U$ later in Lemma 4.1 and Lemma 4.2. So by using Theorem 1.7, one can obtain the Lipschitz regularity and piecewise gradient Hölder estimates which were already obtained in [19, 20].

Corollary 1.8. For the composite cube $\left(Q_{3 R},\left\{\varphi_{k}: k \in K_{+}\right\}\right)$, assume that

\inf _{x^{\prime} \in Q_{3 R}^{\prime}}\left|\varphi_{k}\right|<4 R \quad\left(k \in K_{+}\right) .
$$

Also for $\mu$ in (1.8), assume (1.6), (1.7) and that

$$

for any $1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n, 1 \leq i, j \leq N$ and $k \in K$. Let $u$ be a weak solution of

Then we have that $D u \in L^{\infty}\left(Q_{R}\right)$ and $D u \in C^{\mu}\left(Q_{R}^{l}\right)$ for any $l \in K$ with the estimates

and

[D u]_{C^{\mu}\left(Q_{R}^{l}\right)}^{2} \leq \frac{c}{R^{2 \mu}}\left(f_{Q_{2 R}}|D u|^{2} d x+\|F\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{2 R}\right)}^{2}+R^{2 \mu} \sup _{k \in K}[F]_{C^{\mu}\left(Q_{2 R}^{k}\right)}^{2}\right)

for any $l \in K$. Here, the constant c depends on $n, N, \lambda, \Lambda, \sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left\|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{3 R}^{\prime}\right)}$, $R^{\gamma} \sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right]_{C^{\gamma}\left(Q_{3 R}^{\prime}\right)}, R^{\mu} \sup _{k \in K}\left[A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}\right]_{C^{\mu}\left(Q_{2 R}^{k}\right)}$ and the number of elements in the set $K$.

We refer to Calderón-Zygmund type estimate for linear equations [10-12,21] and $p$-Laplace type equations $[13,22]$. Also there is another direction about the elliptic equation from composite materials which is the blow up phenomenon such as two almost touching fibres having the extreme ( 0 or $\infty$ ) conductivities, see $[1,14]$.

For the sake of the convenience, unless specified, we employ the letter $c \geq 1$ throughout this paper to denote any constants that can be explicitly computed in terms of the constants $n, N, \lambda, \Lambda, \sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left\|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{3 R}^{\prime}\right)}$, $R^{\gamma} \sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right]_{C^{\gamma}\left(Q_{3 R}^{\prime}\right)}, R^{\mu} \sup _{k \in K}\left[A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}\right]_{C^{\mu}\left(Q_{2 R}^{k}\right)}(1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n, 1 \leq$ $i, j \leq n)$ and $|K|$ the number of elements in the set $K$. Thus the exact value denoted by $c$ may change from line to line in a given computation.

## 2. Estimates on the derivative of the naturally induced flow

In this section we will prove that the derivative of the naturally induced flow $\pi$ in (1.4) is locally Hölder continuous in the cube.

### 2.1. Decay estimate for the graph functions

To handle two non-crossing graph functions in $\left\{\varphi_{k}: k \in K_{+}\right\}$, we use following result, which naturally holds from our geometric settings (also see [20, Section 5] or [19, Section 4]).
Lemma 2.1. Suppose that $\varphi_{k}, \varphi_{l}: C^{1, \gamma}\left(Q_{r+\rho}^{\prime}\right) \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ satisfy that

\left\|\varphi_{k}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{r+\rho}^{\prime}\right)},\left\|\varphi_{l}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{r+\rho}^{\prime}\right)}^{\prime} \leq c_{2}
\end{gathered}
$$

and

$$
\varphi_{k} \leq \varphi_{l} \quad \text { in } \quad Q_{r+\rho}^{\prime}
$$

Then we have that

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{l}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)\right| \leq 3 \rho^{-1}\left(\rho^{1+\gamma} c_{1}+2 c_{2}\right)^{\frac{1}{\gamma+1}}\left[\varphi_{l}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)\right]^{\frac{\gamma}{\gamma+1}} \tag{2.1}
\end{equation*}
$$

for any $x^{\prime} \in Q_{r}^{\prime}$.
Proof. Fix $x^{\prime} \in Q_{r}^{\prime}$. Choose $y^{\prime} \in Q_{r+\rho}^{\prime}$ with

\end{equation*}

Then by the Taylor expansion of $\varphi_{l}-\varphi_{k}$ with respect to $x^{\prime}$,

& {\left[\varphi_{l}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)\right]-\left[\varphi_{l}\left(y^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)\right] } \\
\geq & {\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{l}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)\right] \cdot\left(x^{\prime}-y^{\prime}\right) } \\
& \left.-\left(\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{l}\right]_{C^{\gamma}\left(Q_{r+\rho}^{\prime}\right)}\right)+\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right]_{C^{\gamma}\left(Q_{r+\rho}^{\prime}\right)}\right)\left|x^{\prime}-y^{\prime}\right|^{1+\gamma} .
\end{aligned}
$$

Since $\varphi_{l}\left(y^{\prime}\right) \geq \varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)$, we find from (2.2) that

\geq & \rho\left|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{l}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)\right|\left(\frac{\left[\varphi_{l}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)\right]}{\rho^{1+\gamma} c_{1}+2 c_{2}}\right)^{\frac{1}{\gamma+1}} \\
& -\frac{\left.\rho^{\gamma+1}\left(\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{l}\right]_{C^{\gamma}\left(Q_{r+\rho}^{\prime}\right)}\right)+\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right]_{C^{\gamma}\left(Q_{r+\rho}^{\prime}\right)}^{\prime}\right)\left[\varphi_{l}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)\right]}{\rho^{\gamma+1} c_{1}+2 c_{2}} .
\end{aligned}
$$

So with that $\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right]_{C^{\gamma}\left(Q_{r+\rho}^{\prime}\right)},\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{l}\right]_{C^{\gamma}\left(Q_{r+\rho}^{\prime}\right)} \leq c_{1}$, we absorb the last term on the right-hand side to the left-hand side to find that

and so the lemma holds.

Remark 2.2. With the assumption in the main theorems, the estimate (2.1) in Lemma 2.1 has scaling invariance. By taking $r=2 R$ and $\rho=R$, we use the condition (1.9) to find that

\leq & 6\left[R^{\gamma} \sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right]_{C^{\gamma}\left(Q_{3 R}^{\prime}\right)}+1+n \sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left\|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{3 R}^{\prime}\right)}\right]^{\frac{1}{\gamma+1}}\left[\frac{\varphi_{l}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)}{R}\right]^{\frac{\gamma}{\gamma+1}}
\end{aligned}
$$ for any $x^{\prime} \in Q_{2 R}^{\prime}$ and $k, l \in K_{+}$.

In the main theorem, we obtain the estimate with respect to the cube $Q_{3 R}$. But for proving the main theorem, we localize the problem and derive the estimates with respect to the cube $Q_{r}(z) \subset Q_{2 R}$. So from now on, we will assume that
$\left|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{l}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)\right| \leq \kappa R^{-2 \mu}\left|\varphi_{l}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)\right|^{2 \mu} \quad\left(x^{\prime} \in Q_{r}^{\prime}(z), l, k \in K_{+}\right)$ for some constant $\kappa>0$, where this constant will be chosen as

\kappa= & 18 n\left(1+R^{\gamma} \sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right]_{C^{\gamma}\left(Q_{3 R}^{\prime}\right)}+\sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left\|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{3 R}^{\prime}\right)}\right) \\
& +R^{2 \mu} \sup _{k \in K}\left[A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}\right]_{C^{\mu}\left(Q_{2 R}^{k}\right)}^{2},
\end{aligned}
$$

in the proof of the main theorem. Here, we also remark that

R^{2 \mu}\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right]_{C^{2 \mu}\left(Q_{3 R}^{\prime}\right)} \leq(3 n R)^{\gamma}\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right]_{C^{\gamma}\left(Q_{3 R}^{\prime}\right)} \leq \kappa \quad\left(k \in K_{+}\right)
$$

### 2.2. Estimate on $\left(\pi_{2}, \ldots, \pi_{n}\right)$

With Lemma 2.1, we obtain Hölder estimates related to $\pi_{i}$ in Lemma 2.4. The results in this section are obtained with respect to the origin, but the origin can be changed to an arbitrary point in $\mathbb{R}^{n}$ by using translation.

For the composite cube ( $\left.Q_{2 r},\left\{\varphi_{k}: k \in K_{+}\right\}\right)$, let $\pi$ be the derivative of the naturally induced flow $\pi: Q_{2 r} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{n}$ in Definition 1.4. Then

\pi=\left(-1, \pi^{\prime}\right)=\left(-1, \pi_{2}, \ldots, \pi_{n}\right) \tag{2.3}
\end{equation*}
$$

where

\begin{equation*}
\pi_{\alpha}(x)=D_{\alpha} \varphi_{k+1}\left(x^{\prime}\right) \cdot T_{k}(x)+D_{\alpha} \varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right) \cdot\left[1-T_{k}(x)\right] \quad \text { in } \quad Q_{2 r}^{k} \tag{2.4}
\end{equation*}
$$

for any $k \in K$ and $\alpha \in\{2, \ldots, n\}$. In view of Lemma 2.1, we assume that

\begin{equation*}
\left|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{l}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)\right| \leq \kappa\left(\frac{\left|\varphi_{l}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)\right|}{R}\right)^{2 \mu} \quad\left(x^{\prime} \in Q_{2 r}, k, l \in K_{+}\right) \tag{2.5}
\end{equation*}
$$

and

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)\right| \leq \kappa\left(\frac{\left|x^{\prime}-y^{\prime}\right|}{R}\right)^{2 \mu}\left(x^{\prime}, y^{\prime} \in Q_{2 r}^{\prime}, k \in K_{+}\right) \tag{2.6}
\end{equation*}
$$

for some constants $\kappa>0$ and $R>0$. Also recall from (1.8) that $2 \mu=\frac{\gamma}{\gamma+1}$.
For this subsection, we employ the letter $c \geq 1$ to denote any constants that can be explicitly computed in terms such as $n, \kappa, \sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left\|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{2 r}^{\prime}\right)}$ and the number of elements in the set $K$.

We first handle the case when the two points belong to the same region.
Lemma 2.3. Under the assumptions (2.5) and (2.6), we have that

Proof. Let $y=\left(y^{1}, y^{\prime}\right) \in \overline{Q_{2 r}^{k}} \cap Q_{2 r}$ and $z=\left(z^{1}, z^{\prime}\right) \in \overline{Q_{2 r}^{k}} \cap Q_{2 r}$. Then

So we obtain that
(2.11) $\left|w-z^{1}\right| \leq\left|\varphi_{k+1}\left(z^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}\right)\right|+2\left|\varphi_{k}\left(z^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)\right|+\left|y^{1}-z^{1}\right| \leq c|y-z|$,
and

\left|w-y^{1}\right| \leq\left|\varphi_{k+1}\left(z^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}\right)\right|+2\left|\varphi_{k}\left(z^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)\right| \leq c|y-z| \tag{2.12}
\end{equation*}
$$

So the claim (2.9) holds from (2.10), (2.11) and (2.12).
To estimate $\pi^{\prime}(y)-\pi^{\prime}(z)$, with (2.8), we make the following computations that

& =\frac{D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k+1}\left(z^{\prime}\right)\left[z^{1}-w\right]}{\varphi_{k+1}\left(z^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(z^{\prime}\right)}+\frac{D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k+1}\left(z^{\prime}\right)\left[y^{1}-\varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)\right]}{\varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)}
\end{aligned}
$$

and

\begin{aligned}
\frac{D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(z^{\prime}\right)\left[\varphi_{k+1}\left(z^{\prime}\right)-z^{1}\right]}{\varphi_{k+1}\left(z^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(z^{\prime}\right)} & =\frac{D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(z^{\prime}\right)\left[\varphi_{k+1}\left(z^{\prime}\right)-w+w-z^{1}\right]}{\varphi_{k+1}\left(z^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(z^{\prime}\right)} \\
& =\frac{D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(z^{\prime}\right)\left[\varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}\right)-y^{1}\right]}{\varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)}+\frac{D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(z^{\prime}\right)\left[w-z^{1}\right]}{\varphi_{k+1}\left(z^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(z^{\prime}\right)}
\end{aligned}
$$

By the definition of $\pi^{\prime}(y)$ and $\pi^{\prime}(z)$ in (1.5),

\pi^{\prime}(z)-\pi^{\prime}(y)= & {\left[\frac{D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k+1}\left(z^{\prime}\right)\left[z^{1}-\varphi_{k}\left(z^{\prime}\right)\right]}{\varphi_{k+1}\left(z^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(z^{\prime}\right)}+\frac{D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(z^{\prime}\right)\left[\varphi_{k+1}\left(z^{\prime}\right)-z^{1}\right]}{\varphi_{k+1}\left(z^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(z^{\prime}\right)}\right] } \\
& -\left[\frac{D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}\right)\left[y^{1}-\varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)\right]}{\varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)}+\frac{D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)\left[\varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}\right)-y^{1}\right]}{\varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)}\right] .
\end{aligned}

& +\frac{\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(z^{\prime}\right)-D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)\right]\left[\varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}\right)-y^{1}\right]}{\varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)} \\
& +\frac{\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k+1}\left(z^{\prime}\right)-D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}\right)\right]\left[y^{1}-\varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)\right]}{\varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)} .

\left|\pi^{\prime}(z)-\pi^{\prime}(y)\right| \leq c \kappa\left[\left(\frac{\left|z^{1}-w\right|}{R}\right)^{2 \mu}+\left(\frac{\left|y^{\prime}-z^{\prime}\right|}{R}\right)^{2 \mu}\right]
$$

and the lemma follows from (2.11).
With Lemma 2.3, we now obtain the Hölder continuity of $\pi^{\prime}$ in $Q_{2 r}$.

Lemma 2.4. Under the assumptions (2.5) and (2.6), we have that

\left|\pi^{\prime}(y)-\pi^{\prime}(z)\right| \leq c \kappa\left(\frac{|y-z|}{R}\right)^{2 \mu} \quad\left(y, z \in Q_{2 r}\right)

Proof. If $y, z \in Q_{2 r}^{k}(k \in K)$, then the lemma holds from Lemma 2.3. So suppose that $y \in Q_{2 r}^{k}$ and $z \in Q_{2 r}^{l}$ with $k<l(k, l \in K)$. Let $\alpha:[0,1] \rightarrow Q_{2 r}$ be a line connecting $y$ and $z$. Then on the line $\alpha$, one can choose the points

w_{l}=\left(\varphi_{l}\left(w_{l}^{\prime}\right), w_{l}^{\prime}\right) \in \overline{Q_{2 r}^{l-1}} \cap \overline{Q_{2 r}^{l}}
$$

Let $y=w_{k}$ and $z=w_{l+1}$. Since $y \in Q_{2 r}^{k}$ and $z \in Q_{2 r}^{l}$, we find from (2.15) and Lemma 2.3 that

Since the points $y=w_{k}, w_{k+1}, w_{k+1}, \ldots, w_{l}$ and $w_{l+1}=z$ are placed on the line connecting $y$ and $z$, we get that

So the lemma follows by the triangle inequality.

## 3. Gradient estimates for reference equations

In this section, we obtain gradient estimates for when the coefficients are measurable in one variable. The results in this section are based on [6] and [7, Lemma 3.5], but we write this section for the convenience of the readers. For the extension to nonlinear problems, see [4]. For this section, we employ the letter $c \geq 1$ to denote any constants that can be explicitly computed in terms such as $n, N, \lambda$ and $\Lambda$.

Assume that

\end{equation*}
$$

for some positive constants $\lambda$ and $\Lambda$. Let $h \in W^{1,2}\left(Q_{2}, \mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ be a weak solution of

Lemma 3.1. Under the assumption (3.1), let $h$ be a weak solution of (3.2). Then

Choose a cut-off function $\phi \in C_{c}^{\infty}\left(Q_{2 \rho}\right)$ with

We test (3.3) by $\left[h^{i}-\left(h^{i}\right)_{Q_{2 \rho}}\right] \phi^{2}$ to find that

& \int_{Q_{2 \rho}}\left\langle A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}\left(x^{1}\right) D_{\beta}\left[h^{j}-\left(h^{j}\right)_{Q_{2 \rho}}\right], D_{\alpha}\left[h^{i}-\left(h^{i}\right)_{Q_{2 \rho}}\right]\right\rangle \phi^{2} d x \\
= & -\int_{Q_{2 \rho}}\left\langle A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}\left(x^{1}\right) D_{\beta}\left[h^{j}-\left(h^{j}\right)_{Q_{2 \rho}}\right],\left[h^{i}-\left(h^{i}\right)_{Q_{2 \rho}}\right] 2 \phi D_{\alpha} \phi\right\rangle d x .
\end{aligned}
$$

Then by (3.1) and Young's inequality, we have

and the lemma follows from (3.4).
We have the following higher order estimate in the following lemma.
Lemma 3.2. Under the assumption (3.1), let $h$ be a weak solution of (3.2). Then for any integer $p \geq 0$, we have that

Let $q \in\{0, \ldots, p\}$ and $\rho_{q}=1+\frac{1}{q+1} . \operatorname{Fix}\left(0, \xi^{\prime}\right) \in \mathbb{N}^{n}$ with $\left|\left(0, \xi^{\prime}\right)\right|=q$. Then we have that

Choose a cut-off function $\phi \in C_{c}^{\infty}\left(Q_{\rho_{q}}\right)$ with

We test (3.5) by $D_{\xi^{\prime}}\left(h^{i}-\left(h^{i}\right)_{Q_{2}}\right) \phi^{2}$ to find that

& \int_{Q_{\rho_{q}}}\left\langle A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}\left(x^{1}\right) D_{\beta}\left[D_{\xi^{\prime}}\left(h^{j}-\left(h^{j}\right)_{Q_{2}}\right)\right], D_{\alpha}\left[D_{\xi^{\prime}}\left(h^{i}-\left(h^{i}\right)_{Q_{2}}\right)\right]\right\rangle \phi^{2} d x \\
= & -\int_{Q_{\rho_{q}}}\left\langle A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}\left(x^{1}\right) D_{\beta}\left[D_{\xi^{\prime}}\left(h^{i}-\left(h^{i}\right)_{Q_{2}}\right)\right],\left[D_{\xi^{\prime}}\left(h^{i}-\left(h^{i}\right)_{Q_{2}}\right)\right] 2 \phi D_{\alpha} \phi\right\rangle d x .
\end{aligned}
$$

Then by (3.2) and Young's inequality,

\int_{Q_{\rho_{q}}}\left|D D_{\xi^{\prime}}\left(h-(h)_{Q_{2 \theta}}\right)\right|^{2} \phi^{2} d x \leq c \int_{Q_{\rho_{q}}}\left|D_{\xi^{\prime}}\left(h-(h)_{Q_{2 \theta}}\right)\right|^{2}|D \phi|^{2} d x,

whence we have from (3.6) that

Proof. By using an approximation argument, we may assume that $h \in C^{1}\left(Q_{2}\right)$. To use the Sobolev type embedding, we take an integer $p>\frac{n}{2}$.

Let $\left(x^{1}, x^{\prime}\right),\left(y^{1}, y^{\prime}\right) \in Q_{1}$. We use the Sobolev embedding theorem in $x^{1}$ variable to find

So we have that

\left|h\left(x^{1}, x^{\prime}\right)-h\left(x^{1}, y^{\prime}\right)\right|^{2} \leq c|x-y| \sum_{0 \leq q \leq p} \int_{Q_{1}}\left|D_{x^{\prime}}^{q} D h\left(z^{1}, z^{\prime}\right)\right|^{2} d z^{1} d z^{\prime} \tag{3.8}
\end{equation*}
$$

By combining (3.7) and (3.8), we discover that

Next, we handle the inhomogeneous case. Under the assumptions (3.1), let $w \in W^{1,2}\left(Q_{2}, \mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ be a weak solution of

Set $W: Q_{2} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{N n}$, where $W=\left(W^{1}, \ldots, W^{N}\right)^{T}$ and

\begin{equation*}
W^{i}=\left(\left[-\sum_{1 \leq j \leq N} \sum_{1 \leq \beta \leq n} A_{i j}^{1 \beta}\left(x^{1}\right) D_{\beta} w^{j}\right]+F_{1}^{i}\left(x^{1}\right), D_{x^{\prime}} w^{i}\right) \tag{3.10}
\end{equation*}
$$

for any $1 \leq i \leq N$. Then $A_{i j}^{1 \beta}\left(x^{1}\right) D_{\beta} w^{j}-F_{1}^{i}\left(x^{1}\right)$ is weakly differentiable for any $i \in\{1, \ldots, N\}$ as in the following lemma.

Lemma 3.4. With (3.1), let $w$ be a weak solution of (3.9). Then

So by the definition of weak solution and (3.9), $A_{i j}^{1 \beta}\left(x^{1}\right) D_{\beta} w^{j}-F_{1}^{i}\left(x^{1}\right)$ are weakly differentiable in the $x^{1}$-variable. Thus

\end{aligned}

for a.e. $x \in Q_{2}$ and $1 \leq i \leq N$. So we find that

& \leq\left|D_{1}\left[A_{i j}^{1 \beta}\left(x^{1}\right) D_{\beta} w^{j}(x)-F_{1}^{i}\left(x^{1}\right)\right]\right|+\left|D_{x^{\prime}}\left[A_{i j}^{1 \beta}\left(x^{1}\right) D_{\beta} w^{j}(x)-F_{1}^{i}\left(x^{1}\right)\right]\right| \\
& \leq c\left|D D_{x^{\prime}} w(x)\right|
\end{aligned}
$$

for a.e. $x \in Q_{2}$ and $1 \leq i \leq N$.

With Lemma 3.4, we obtain the following excess decay estimate.
Lemma 3.5. Under the assumption (3.1), let $w$ be a weak solution of (3.9). Then for $W$ in (3.10), we have that

\int_{Q_{\rho}}\left|D D_{x^{\prime}} w\right|^{2} d x \leq \frac{c}{\rho^{2}} \int_{Q_{2 \rho}}\left|D_{x^{\prime}} w-\left(D_{x^{\prime}} w\right)_{Q_{2 \rho}}\right|^{2} d x \tag{3.15}
\end{equation*}
$$

for any $\rho \in(0,1]$.
With (3.10), by Poincaré's inequality and Lemma 3.4,

$$

for any $\rho \in(0,1 / 2]$. By (3.14) and (3.15),

\rho^{2} f_{Q_{\rho}}\left|D D_{x^{\prime}} w\right|^{2} d x & \leq f_{Q_{2 \rho}}\left|D_{x^{\prime}} w-\left(D_{x^{\prime}} w\right)_{Q_{2 \rho}}\right|^{2} d x \\
& \leq c \rho \int_{Q_{2}}\left|D_{x^{\prime}} w-\left(D_{x^{\prime}} w\right)_{Q_{2}}\right|^{2} d x
\end{aligned}
$$

for any $\rho \in(0,1 / 2]$. Thus

f_{Q_{\rho}}\left|W_{1}-\left(W_{1}\right)_{Q_{\rho}}\right|^{2} d x \leq c \rho \int_{Q_{2}}\left|D_{x^{\prime}} w-\left(D_{x^{\prime}} w\right)_{Q_{2}}\right|^{2} d x
$$

for any $\rho \in(0,1 / 2]$. So with (3.14), we find from (3.10) and Hölder's inequality that

for any $\rho \in(0,1 / 2]$. If $\rho \in(1 / 2,2]$, then one can check that

& \leq c f_{Q_{2}}\left|W-(W)_{Q_{2}}\right|^{2} d x
\end{aligned}

which implies that

for any $\rho \in(1 / 2,2]$. So we discover from (3.16) and (3.17) that the lemma holds.

## 4. Comparison of Hölder norm

In Section 3, we derived the excess decay estimate with respect to the functional $W$ not the gradient of the weak solution $D w$. With this estimate, we will obtain the excess decay estimate with respect to the functional $U$ in (4.3) (which corresponds to $W$ ) not $D u$. So to obtain the piecewise Hölder continuity of $D u$, we compare the Hölder norm of $U$ and the Hölder norm of $D u$ in this section.

In the later sections we will consider composite cubes. So unlike $W$ in (3.10), $U$ in (4.3) depends on $\pi^{\prime}$ in (1.4) which was naturally induced by our geometry. In fact, we will use Lemma 5.9 in the later paper [16]. So to minimize the condition of the results, we consider only one point for Lemma 4.1 and two points for Lemma 4.2.

We compare $U$ with $D u$ and $F$ in the following lemma. Later, we will take $\zeta_{\beta}^{j}=D_{\beta} u^{j}$.

Lemma 4.1. Let $\pi=\left(-1, \pi_{2}, \ldots, \pi_{n}\right) \in \mathbb{R}^{n}$ and $\pi_{1}=-1$. For the constants

\end{align*}

for any $i=1, \ldots, N$. Thus

= & \sum_{1 \leq i \leq N} \zeta_{1}^{i}\left(\sum_{1 \leq \alpha \leq n} \pi_{\alpha}\left[\left(\sum_{1 \leq j \leq N} \sum_{2 \leq \beta \leq n} A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta} U_{\beta}^{j}\right)-F_{\alpha}^{i}\right]-U_{1}^{i}\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

So from (1.6), (1.7) and that $\pi_{1}=-1$, we obtain that

Moreover, from (4.4) and (4.7), we discover that

To obtain the Hölder semi-norm $D u$ with the Hölder semi-norms $U$ and $F$, we consider the two points set as a domain in the following lemma.

Lemma 4.2. For fixed $x, y \in \mathbb{R}^{n}(x \neq y)$, let $\pi=\left(-1, \pi_{2}, \ldots, \pi_{n}\right):\{x, y\} \rightarrow$ $\mathbb{R}^{n}$ and $\pi_{1}=-1$. For the functions
$A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}:\{x, y\} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{N n} \times \mathbb{R}^{N n}, \quad F_{\alpha}^{i}:\{x, y\} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{N n} \quad$ and $\quad \zeta_{\alpha}^{i}:\{x, y\} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{N n}$, satisfying (1.6) and (1.7) $(1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n, 1 \leq i, j \leq N)$, we define $U:\{x, y\} \rightarrow$ $\mathbb{R}^{N n}$ as

where the constant $c$ only depends on $n, N, \lambda$ and $\Lambda$.
Proof. In this proof, $c$ denotes a constant only depending on $n, N, \lambda$ and $\Lambda$.

= & \sum_{1 \leq j \leq N}\left[\sum_{1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n} A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}(y) \pi_{\alpha}(y) \pi_{\beta}(y)\right] \zeta_{1}^{j}(y)  \tag{4.12}\\
& +\sum_{1 \leq j \leq N} \sum_{1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n}\left[A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}(x) \pi_{\alpha}(x) \pi_{\beta}(x)-A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}(y) \pi_{\alpha}(y) \pi_{\beta}(y)\right] \zeta_{1}^{j}(x) \\
& -\sum_{1 \leq j \leq N}\left[\sum_{1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n} A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}(x) \pi_{\alpha}(x) \pi_{\beta}(x)\right] \zeta_{1}^{j}(x)
\end{align*}

for any $i=1, \ldots, N$. With (1.6), we use the left-hand side of (4.12) as follows:

\leq & \left|\zeta_{1}(x)-\zeta_{1}(y)\right| \sum_{1 \leq i \leq N}\left|\sum_{1 \leq j \leq N}\left[\sum_{1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n} A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}(y) \pi_{\alpha}(y) \pi_{\beta}(y)\right]\left[\zeta_{1}^{j}(y)-\zeta_{1}^{j}(x)\right]\right|
\end{aligned}

which implies that

\end{align*}

We next estimate the right-hand side of (4.12). With (4.11), one can prove that

\begin{aligned}
& +c[|U(x)|+|F(x)|]|\pi(x)-\pi(y)| \\
& +c[|U(x)|+|F(x)|]|\pi(y)| \sum_{1 \leq i, j \leq N} \sum_{1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n}\left|A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}(y)-A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}(x)\right|
\end{aligned}
$$

for any $i=1, \ldots, N$. Since $\pi_{1}=-1$, one can check from (1.7) that

& \leq c \sum_{1 \leq i, j \leq N} \sum_{1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n}\left|A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}(x)-A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}(y)\right||\pi(x)||\pi(y)| \\
& \quad+c|\pi(x)-\pi(y)|[|\pi(x)|+|\pi(y)|]\left|\zeta_{1}(x)\right|
\end{aligned}
$$

for any $i=1, \ldots, N$. In view of Lemma 4.1, we have that

& \quad+c[|U(x)|+|F(x)|]\left[|\pi(y)| \sum_{1 \leq i, j \leq N} \sum_{1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n}\left|A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}(y)-A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}(x)\right|\right]
\end{aligned}
$$

for any $i=1, \ldots, N$. Since $\pi(y)=\left(-1, \pi_{2}(y), \ldots, \pi_{n}(y)\right)$, we find from (4.13) that

& +c[|U(x)|+|F(x)|] \sum_{1 \leq i, j \leq N} \sum_{1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n}\left|A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}(y)-A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}(x)\right| .
\end{align*}
$$

Moreover, combining (4.10), (4.14) and (4.15), we discover that

& +c[|U(x)|+|F(x)|]\left[|\pi(x)-\pi(y)|+|\pi(x)-\pi(y)|^{2}\right] \\
& +c[|U(x)|+|F(x)|] \sum_{1 \leq i, j \leq N} \sum_{1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n}\left|A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}(y)-A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}(x)\right|
\end{aligned}
$$

for any $\beta=2, \ldots, n$. With $|\pi(y)| \geq 1$, this and (4.15) complete the proof.

## 5. Excess decay estimates

We obtain the desired excess decay estimates in this section. For the first subsection, we consider the case when $\left|\pi^{\prime}\right|$ decays with respect to the size of the cube and the coefficients are piecewise constant. Then in the next subsection, we consider the case when $\left|\pi^{\prime}\right|$ has no decay assumption and the coefficients are piecewise constant. For the last subsection, we handle the case when the coefficients are piecewise Hölder continuous with no decay assumption on $\left|\pi^{\prime}\right|$ by using the perturbation argument.

### 5.1. Piecewise constant coefficients with decay assumption

Choose a size $\tau \in(0, R]$. For a composite cube $\left(Q_{\tau},\left\{\varphi_{k}: k \in K_{+}\right\}\right)$, let $\pi$ be the derivative of the naturally induced flow $\pi: Q_{\tau} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{n}$ in Definition 1.4. Then

\pi=\left(-1, \pi^{\prime}\right)=\left(-1, \pi_{2}, \ldots, \pi_{n}\right)
$$

where

$$
\pi_{\alpha}(x)=D_{\alpha} \varphi_{k+1}\left(x^{\prime}\right) \cdot T_{k}(x)+D_{\alpha} \varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right) \cdot\left[1-T_{k}(x)\right] \quad \text { in } Q_{\tau}^{k}
$$

for any $k \in K$ and $\alpha \in\{2, \ldots, n\}$. For some universal constant $\nu \geq 1$ which will be determined later, we also assume an decay of $\pi^{\prime}$ that

\left|\pi^{\prime}(0)\right|=0 \quad \text { and } \quad\left|\pi^{\prime}\right| \leq \nu\left(\frac{\rho}{R}\right)^{2 \mu} \quad \text { in } \quad Q_{\rho} \tag{5.1}

for any $0<\rho \leq \tau$.
For this subsection, we employ the letter $c \geq 1$ to denote any constants that can be explicitly computed in terms such as $n, N, \lambda, \Lambda, \kappa, R^{\gamma} \sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right]_{C_{\gamma}\left(Q_{\tau}^{\prime}\right)}$ and the number of elements in the set $K$.

We first handle the case when the coefficients are piecewise constants. For the constants $A_{i j, k}^{\alpha \beta}, F_{\alpha, k}^{i}(1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n, 1 \leq i, j \leq N, k \in K)$ satisfying that

we define $A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}, F_{\alpha}^{i}(1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n, 1 \leq i, j \leq N)$ as

We remark that $A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}$ and $F_{\alpha}^{i}(1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n, 1 \leq i, j \leq N)$ are constants in each $Q_{\tau}^{k}(k \in K)$. Then one can check from (5.2) that

By using the Gehring-Giaquinta-Modica type inequality, see for instance [5, Theorem 5.6], one can prove that

\left(f_{Q_{\frac{\theta}{2}}}|D w|^{2+\sigma} d x\right)^{\frac{2}{2+\sigma}} \leq c\left(f_{Q_{\theta}}|D w|^{2} d x+\|F\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{\theta}\right)}^{2}\right) \quad(\theta \in(0, \tau]) \tag{5.6}
\end{equation*}
$$

for some small universal constant $\sigma \in(0,1]$. We define $W: Q_{\tau} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{N n}$ as $W=\left(W^{1}, \ldots, W^{N}\right)^{T}$, where

\end{equation*}

for any $1 \leq i \leq N$.
Fix $\theta \in(0, \tau]$. For each $k \in K_{+}$, one can choose $z_{k}^{\prime} \in Q_{\theta}^{\prime}$ so that

It follows from the definition of $\pi^{\prime}$ in Definition 1.4, (5.1) and (5.9) that

\sum_{i=0}^{j} \delta^{\frac{\mu \sigma i}{2+\sigma}}\left|(W)_{Q_{\tau_{i}}}\right| \leq 10 \delta^{-n}\left(\sum_{i=0}^{j} \delta^{\frac{\mu \sigma i}{2+\sigma}}\right)\left[\left(f_{Q_{\tau_{0}}}|W|^{2} d x\right)^{\frac{1}{2}}+\|F\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{\tau}\right)}\right]
$$

We also note that

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left(f_{Q_{\tau_{0}}}\left|W-(W)_{Q_{\tau_{0}}}\right|^{2} d x\right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \leq 2\left(f_{Q_{\tau_{0}}}|W|^{2} d x\right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \tag{5.31}
\end{equation*}
$$

Therefore, we have from (5.28) that

& \left|(W)_{Q_{\tau_{j+1}}}-(W)_{Q_{\tau_{0}}}\right| \\
\leq & 8 \delta^{-\frac{n}{2}}\left(f_{Q_{\tau_{0}}}|W|^{2} d x\right)^{\frac{1}{2}}+\delta^{-n}\left[\left(f_{Q_{\tau_{0}}}|W|^{2} d x\right)^{\frac{1}{2}}+\|F\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{\tau}\right)}\right]
\end{aligned}

We now remember that $\delta \in(0,1]$ to get the desired (5.30).
Since $\tau_{i}=\delta^{i} \tau$, we find from (5.28), (5.29), (5.30) and (5.31) that

because $\delta \in(0,1)$ was chosen universal. So by (5.30) and that $\tau_{i}=\delta^{i} \tau(i=$ $0,1, \ldots$ ),

f_{Q_{\tau_{j}}}|W|^{2} d x \leq c\left[f_{Q_{\tau}}|W|^{2} d x+\|F\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{\tau}\right)}^{2}\right] \quad(j=0,1,2, \ldots)

Since $\delta \in(0,1)$ was a universal constant, we find that

for any $0<\rho \leq \tau$ and the lemma follows.

### 5.2. Linear coordinate transformation

To apply Lemma 5.2 and Lemma 5.3 for the general situation, we use a linear coordinate transformation. To use a coordinate transformation $\Psi$, we define 'the derivative of the naturally induced flow respect to $\Psi$ ' in Definition 5.4 corresponding to 'the derivative of the naturally induced flow' in Definition 1.4.

For this subsection, we employ the letter $c \geq 1$ to denote any constants that can be explicitly computed in terms $n, \sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left\|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{r}^{\prime}\right)}, R^{\gamma} \sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right]_{C^{\gamma}\left(Q_{r}^{\prime}\right)}$ and the number of the element in the set $K$.

Definition 5.4. Suppose that ( $Q_{r},\left\{\varphi_{k}: k \in K_{+}\right\}$) is a composite cube. For any $Q_{\tau}(z) \subset Q_{r}$ and $\zeta^{\prime} \in \mathbb{R}^{n-1}$, let $\Psi: Q_{\tau}(z) \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{n}$ be a linear coordinate transformation defined as

\Psi(x)=\left(x^{1}-z^{1}-\zeta^{\prime} \cdot\left(x^{\prime}-z^{\prime}\right), x^{\prime}-z^{\prime}\right)
$$

Let $y=\Psi(x)$ be the new coordinate system. Then we define the derivative of the naturally induced flow with respect to $\Psi$ as follows.

Let the new graph $\left\{\left(\tilde{\varphi}_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right), y^{\prime}\right): y^{\prime} \in Q_{\tau}^{\prime}\right\}$ be the transformation of the graph $\left\{\left(\varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right), x^{\prime}\right): x^{\prime} \in Q_{\tau}^{\prime}(z)\right\}$ under the coordinate transformation $\Psi$. For any $k \in K$, set $\tilde{T}_{k}: \Psi\left(Q_{\tau}(z)\right) \rightarrow[0,1]$ as

\tilde{T}_{k}\left(y^{1}, y^{\prime}\right)=\frac{y^{1}-\tilde{\varphi}_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)}{\tilde{\varphi}_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}\right)-\tilde{\varphi}_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)} \text { in } \Psi\left(Q_{\tau}^{k}(z)\right) \tag{5.32}
\end{equation*}
$$

Then the following vector-valued function $\tilde{\pi}: \Psi\left(Q_{\tau}(z)\right) \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{n}$

\tilde{\pi}=\left(-1, \tilde{\pi}^{\prime}\right)=\left(\tilde{\pi}_{1}, \tilde{\pi}_{2}, \ldots, \tilde{\pi}_{n}\right)
$$

is called the derivative of the naturally induced flow respect to $\Psi$, where $\tilde{\pi}_{1}=$ -1 and
(5.33) $\tilde{\pi}_{\alpha}(y):=D_{y^{\alpha}} \tilde{\varphi}_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}\right) \cdot \tilde{T}_{k}(y)+D_{y^{\alpha}} \tilde{\varphi}_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right) \cdot\left[1-\tilde{T}_{k}(y)\right] \quad$ in $\Psi\left(Q_{\tau}^{k}(z)\right)$
for any $k \in K$ and $\alpha \in\{2, \ldots, n\}$.
To apply the coordinate transformation, we prove the following lemma. We remark that in the following lemma, $\Psi$ only depends on the point $z \in Q_{r}$ and is independent of the size $\tau$.

Lemma 5.5. Suppose that $\left(Q_{r},\left\{\varphi_{k}: k \in K_{+}\right\}\right)$is a composite cube with the condition that

\leq & \kappa\left(\frac{\left|\varphi_{l}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)\right|}{R}\right)^{2 \mu}\left(x^{\prime} \in Q_{r}^{\prime}, k, l \in K_{+}\right) \tag{5.34}
\end{align*}
$$

and

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)\right| \leq \kappa\left(\frac{\left|x^{\prime}-y^{\prime}\right|}{R}\right)^{2 \mu} \quad\left(x^{\prime}, y^{\prime} \in Q_{r}^{\prime}, k \in K_{+}\right) \tag{5.35}
\end{equation*}
$$

for some constant $\kappa>0$. For $Q_{\tau}(z) \subset Q_{r}$ and the derivative of the naturally induced flow $\pi: Q_{r} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{n}$, let $\Psi: Q_{\tau}(z) \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{n}$ be a linear coordinate transformation defined as

\Psi(x)=\left(x^{1}-z^{1}-\pi^{\prime}(z) \cdot\left(x^{\prime}-z^{\prime}\right), x^{\prime}-z^{\prime}\right)
$$

and $\tilde{\pi}: \Psi\left(Q_{\tau}(z)\right) \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{n}$ be the derivative of the naturally induced flow with respect to $\Psi$. Then

\left|\tilde{\pi}^{\prime}(0)\right|=0 \quad \text { and } \quad\left|\tilde{\pi}^{\prime}\right| \leq c \kappa\left(\frac{\rho}{R}\right)^{2 \mu} \quad \text { in } \quad Q_{\rho}
$$

for any $Q_{\rho} \subset \Psi\left(Q_{\tau}(z)\right)$.
Proof. Let the new graph $\left\{\left(\tilde{\varphi}_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right), y^{\prime}\right): y^{\prime} \in Q_{\tau}^{\prime}\right\}$ be the transformation of the graph $\left\{\left(\varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right), x^{\prime}\right): x^{\prime} \in Q_{\tau}^{\prime}(z)\right\}$ under the linear coordinate transformation $\Psi$. Then one can check that

\end{equation*}

for any $y \in \Psi\left(Q_{\tau}(z)\right)$ and $\alpha \in\{2, \ldots, n\}$. Fix $y=\left(y^{1}, y^{\prime}\right) \in \Psi\left(Q_{\tau}^{k}(z)\right)$ $(k \in K)$. In view of (5.36), we obtain that

& +\frac{\left[D_{x^{\alpha}} \varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right)-\pi_{\alpha}(z)\right]\left[\tilde{\varphi}_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}\right)-y^{1}\right]}{\tilde{\varphi}_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}\right)-\tilde{\varphi}_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)} \\
= & \frac{D_{x^{\alpha}} \varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right)\left[y^{1}-\tilde{\varphi}_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)\right]}{\tilde{\varphi}_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}\right)-\tilde{\varphi}_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)}+\frac{D_{x^{\alpha}} \varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right)\left[\tilde{\varphi}_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}\right)-y^{1}\right]}{\tilde{\varphi}_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}\right)-\tilde{\varphi}_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)} \\
& -\pi_{\alpha}(z)
\end{aligned}
$$

for any $\alpha \in\{2, \ldots, n\}$. It follows from (5.36) that

\begin{align*}
\tilde{\pi}_{\alpha}(y)= & \frac{D_{x^{\alpha}} \varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right)\left[y^{1}+z^{1}+\pi^{\prime}(z) \cdot y^{\prime}-\varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right)\right]}{\varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right)} \\
& +\frac{D_{x^{\alpha}} \varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right)\left[\varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right)-y^{1}-z^{1}-\pi^{\prime}(z) \cdot y^{\prime}\right]}{\varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right)}  \tag{5.38}\\
& -\pi_{\alpha}(z)
\end{align*}
$$

for any $\alpha \in\{2, \ldots, n\}$. Since $y \in \Psi\left(Q_{\tau}^{k}(z)\right)$, we have that

\Psi^{-1}(y)=\left(y^{1}+z^{1}+\pi^{\prime}(z) \cdot y^{\prime}, y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right) \in Q_{\tau}^{k}(z)
$$

Then from (1.5), we obtain that

\begin{aligned}
& \pi_{\alpha}\left(y^{1}+z^{1}+\pi^{\prime}(z) \cdot y^{\prime}, y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right) \\
= & \frac{D_{x^{\alpha}} \varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right)\left[y^{1}+z^{1}+\pi^{\prime}(z) \cdot y^{\prime}-\varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right)\right]}{\varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right)} \\
& +\frac{D_{x^{\alpha}} \varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right)\left[\varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right)-y^{1}-z^{1}-\pi^{\prime}(z) \cdot y^{\prime}\right]}{\varphi_{k+1}\left(y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right)}
\end{aligned}
$$

for any $\alpha \in\{2, \ldots, n\}$. So by (5.38),

\begin{equation*}
\tilde{\pi}_{\alpha}(y)=\pi_{\alpha}\left(y^{1}+z^{1}+\pi^{\prime}(z) \cdot y^{\prime}, y^{\prime}+z^{\prime}\right)-\pi_{\alpha}(z) \tag{5.39}
\end{equation*}
$$

for any $\alpha \in\{2, \ldots, n\}$. Thus

\tilde{\pi}_{\alpha}(0)=0 \quad(\alpha \in\{2, \ldots, n\}) \tag{5.40}
\end{equation*}

Since $y=\left(y^{1}, y^{\prime}\right) \in \Psi\left(Q_{\tau}^{k}(z)\right)(k \in K)$ was arbitrarily chosen, the claim (5.37) holds. By comparing (5.34) and (5.35) with (2.5) and (2.6) respectively, we apply Lemma 2.4 to $\pi$ and (5.37). Then we obtain from (5.39) that

for any $Q_{\rho} \subset \Psi\left(Q_{\tau}(z)\right)$.

### 5.3. Piecewise constant coefficients with no decay assumption

For the composite cube $\left(Q_{r},\left\{\varphi_{k}: k \in K_{+}\right\}\right)$, let $\pi$ be the derivative of the naturally induced flow $\pi: Q_{r} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{n}$. Then

\pi_{\alpha}(x)=D_{\alpha} \varphi_{k+1}\left(x^{\prime}\right) \cdot T_{k}(x)+D_{\alpha} \varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right) \cdot\left[1-T_{k}(x)\right] \quad \text { in } Q_{r}^{k}
$$

for any $k \in K$ and $\alpha \in\{2, \ldots, n\}$. We also assume that

$$
\begin{align*}
& \left|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{l}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)\right| \\
\leq & \kappa\left(\frac{\left|\varphi_{l}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)\right|}{R}\right)^{2 \mu} \quad\left(x^{\prime} \in Q_{r}, k, l \in K_{+}\right), \tag{5.42}
\end{align*}
$$

and

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)\right| \leq \kappa\left(\frac{\left|x^{\prime}-y^{\prime}\right|}{R}\right)^{2 \mu} \quad\left(x^{\prime}, y^{\prime} \in Q_{r}^{\prime}, k \in K_{+}\right) \tag{5.43}
\end{equation*}
$$

for some constant $\kappa>0$.
For this subsection, we employ the letter $c \geq 1$ to denote any constants that can be explicitly computed in terms such as $n, N, \lambda, \Lambda, \sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left\|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{r}^{\prime}\right)}$, $R^{\gamma} \sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right]_{C^{\gamma}\left(Q_{r}^{\prime}\right)}$ and the number of elements in the set $K$.

As in Subsection 5.1, we handle the case when the coefficients are piecewise constants. For the constants $A_{i j, k}^{\alpha \beta}, F_{\alpha, k}^{i}(1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n, 1 \leq i, j \leq N, k \in K)$ satisfying that

\lambda|\xi|^{2} \leq A_{i j, k}^{\alpha \beta} \xi_{\alpha}^{i} \xi_{\beta}^{j} \quad \text { and } \quad\left|A_{i j, k}^{\alpha \beta}\right| \leq \Lambda \quad\left(\xi \in \mathbb{R}^{N n}\right) \tag{5.44}
\end{equation*}
$$

we define $A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}, F_{\alpha}^{i}(1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n, 1 \leq i, j \leq N)$ as

A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}(x)=\sum_{k \in K} A_{i j, k}^{\alpha \beta} \chi_{Q_{r}^{k}} \quad \text { and } \quad F_{\alpha}^{i}(x)=\sum_{k \in K} F_{\alpha, k}^{i} \chi_{Q_{r}^{k}} \quad \text { in } \quad Q_{r} . \tag{5.45}
\end{equation*}
$$

We remark that $A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}$ and $F_{\alpha}^{i}(1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n, 1 \leq i, j \leq N)$ are constants in each $Q_{r}^{k}(k \in K)$. Then one can check from (5.45) that

\lambda|\xi|^{2} \leq A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}(x) \xi_{\alpha}^{i} \xi_{\beta}^{j} \quad \text { and } \quad\left|A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}(x)\right| \leq \Lambda \quad\left(x \in Q_{r}, \xi \in \mathbb{R}^{N n}\right) \tag{5.46}
\end{equation*}
$$

Under the assumption (5.42), (5.44) and (5.45), let $v$ be a weak solution of

\begin{equation*}
D_{\alpha}\left[A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}(x) D_{\beta}^{j} v\right]=D_{\alpha} F_{\alpha}^{i} \text { in } Q_{r} \tag{5.47}
\end{equation*}
$$

Then we define $V: Q_{r} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{N n}$ as $V=\left(V^{1}, \ldots, V^{N}\right)^{T}$, where

$$
\begin{equation*}
V^{i}=\left(\sum_{1 \leq \alpha \leq n} \pi_{\alpha}\left[\left(\sum_{1 \leq j \leq N} \sum_{1 \leq \beta \leq N} A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta} D_{x^{\beta}} v^{j}\right)-F_{\alpha}^{i}\right], D_{x^{\prime}} v^{i}+\pi^{\prime} D_{x^{1}} v^{i}\right) \tag{5.48}
\end{equation*}
$$

for any $1 \leq i \leq N$. In this subsection, we obtain the Lipschitz estimate of $V$ in $Q_{\frac{r}{2}}$ and the excess decay estimate of $V$.

Lemma 5.6. Suppose that $Q_{\tau}(z) \subset Q_{r}$. There exists a small universal constant $\varepsilon \in(0,1]$ such that if $\kappa\left(\frac{r}{R}\right)^{2 \mu} \leq \varepsilon$ and $z$ is a Lebesgue point of $V$, then

|V(z)|^{2} \leq c\left[f_{Q_{\tau}(z)}|V|^{2} d x+\|F\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{\tau}(z)\right)}^{2}\right]
$$

Here, $\varepsilon \in(0,1]$ depends only on $n, N, \lambda, \Lambda$, the number of the element in the set $K, \sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left\|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{r}^{\prime}\right)}$ and $R^{\gamma} \sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right]_{C^{\gamma}\left(Q_{r}^{\prime}\right)}$.
Proof. Define a linear coordinate transformation $\Psi: Q_{\tau}(z) \rightarrow \mathbb{R}^{n}$ with $\Phi=$ $\Psi^{-1}$ as

Let $y=\Psi(x)$ be the new coordinate system. Then for any $\alpha, \beta \in\{2, \ldots, n\}$,

\leq & c\left(\frac{\rho}{\tau}\right) f_{Q_{\tau}}\left|U-(U)_{Q_{\tau}}\right|^{2} d x  \tag{5.76}\\
& +c\left(\frac{\tau}{R}\right)^{2 \mu}\left(\frac{\tau}{\rho}\right)^{n}\left(\kappa f_{Q_{\tau}}|U|^{2} d x+\kappa\|F\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{\tau}\right)}^{2}+\sup _{k \in K}[F]_{C^{\mu}\left(Q_{\tau}^{k}\right)}^{2}\right)
\end{align*}
$$

for any $0<\rho \leq \tau \leq r$.
Proof. Fix $0<\rho \leq \tau \leq r$. For any $k \in K$ with $Q_{\tau}^{k} \neq \emptyset$, we choose the points $z_{k} \in Q_{\tau}^{k}$. On the other-hand, for any $k \in K$ with $Q_{\tau}^{k}=\emptyset$, let $z_{k}=0$ for the simplicity of notation. We remark that we will focus on the set $Q_{\tau}$ and we don't need to consider the set $Q_{\tau}^{k}$ when $Q_{\tau}^{k}=\emptyset$. Set
(5.77) $\quad \bar{A}_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}(x)=\sum_{k \in K} A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}\left(z_{k}\right) \chi_{Q_{\tau}^{k}}$ and $\bar{F}_{\alpha}^{i}(x)=\sum_{k \in K} F_{\alpha, k}^{i}\left(z_{k}\right) \chi_{Q_{\tau}^{k}} \quad$ in $Q_{\tau}$.

Since $A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}, F_{\alpha}^{i} \in C^{\mu}\left(Q_{\tau}^{k}\right)$ for any $k \in K$, we find from (5.73) and (5.77) that

for any $1 \leq i \leq N$. By the triangle inequality, (5.78), (5.79) and (5.82), we compare $U$ in (5.75) and $V$ in (5.83) as follows:

\leq & c\left[f_{Q_{\tau}}|D u-D v|^{2}+\kappa \tau^{2 \mu}|D u|^{2} d x\right] \\
\leq & c\left(\frac{\tau}{R}\right)^{2 \mu}\left[\kappa f_{Q_{\tau}}|D u|^{2} d x+R^{2 \mu} \sup _{k \in K}[F]_{C^{\mu}\left(Q_{\tau}^{k}\right)}^{2}\right] .
\end{aligned}

So it follows from Lemma 4.1 that

Since $\bar{A}_{i j}^{\alpha \beta}(1 \leq \alpha, \beta \leq n, 1 \leq i, j \leq N, k \in K)$ are piecewise constant coefficients and $\kappa\left(\frac{r}{R}\right)^{2 \mu} \leq \varepsilon$, we have from Lemma 5.8 that

for any $0<\rho<r$.
Proof. The proof is the same to that of Lemma 5.3. Instead of (5.27) and $W$, use (5.76) and $U$, respectively.

We extend the technical result [9, Lemma 3.4] to the following lemma.
Lemma 5.11. Let $\phi(t)$ be a nonnegative function on $[0, R]$. Suppose

Since $\tau_{0}^{\beta} \delta^{\beta i}=\tau_{1}^{\beta} \delta^{\beta(i-1)}=\cdots=\tau_{i}^{\beta}$, we obtain that

U^{i}=\left(\sum_{1 \leq \alpha \leq n} \pi_{\alpha}\left[\left(\sum_{1 \leq j \leq N} \sum_{1 \leq \beta \leq n} A_{i j}^{\alpha \beta} D_{\beta} u^{j}\right)-F_{\alpha}^{i}\right], D_{x^{\prime}} u^{i}+\pi^{\prime} D_{1} u^{i}\right),
$$

where $1 \leq i \leq N$, we have that

& \frac{1}{\rho^{2 \mu}} f_{Q_{\rho}}\left|U-(U)_{Q_{\rho}}\right|^{2} d x \\
\leq & \frac{c}{r^{2 \mu}} \int_{Q_{r}}\left|U-(U)_{Q_{r}}\right|^{2} d x \\
& +\frac{c}{R^{2 \mu}}\left(\kappa f_{Q_{r}}|U|^{2} d x+\kappa\|F\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{r}\right)}^{2}+R^{2 \mu} \sup _{k \in K}[F]_{C^{\mu}\left(Q_{\tau}^{k}\right)}^{2}\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

for any $0<\rho \leq r$.
Proof. In view of Lemma 5.10, we have that

\end{equation*}

for any $0<\tau \leq r$. In view of Lemma 5.9, we have that

## 6. Proof of the main theorem

With the assumption in the main theorems, the estimate has scaling invariance. By taking $r=2 R, \rho=R, c_{1}=\sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right]_{C^{\gamma}\left(Q_{3 R}^{\prime}\right)}$ and $c_{2}=\sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left\|\varphi_{k}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{3 R}^{\prime}\right)} \leq 4 R+2 n R \sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left\|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{3 R}^{\prime}\right)}$ in Lemma 2.1, we use the condition (1.9) to find that

\end{aligned}
$$ for any $x^{\prime} \in Q_{2 R}^{\prime}$ and $k, l \in K_{+}$. Since $\mu=\frac{\gamma}{2(\gamma+1)}$, we have that

& \leq(3 n R)^{\frac{\gamma^{2}}{\gamma+1}} \sup _{x^{\prime}, y^{\prime} \in Q_{3 R}^{\prime}} \frac{\left|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)\right|}{\left|x^{\prime}-y^{\prime}\right|^{\gamma}} \\
& =(3 n R)^{\frac{\gamma^{2}}{\gamma+1}}\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right]_{C^{\gamma}\left(Q_{3 R}^{\prime}\right)} .
\end{aligned}
$$

So for the following universal constant

\kappa=18 n\left(1+R^{\gamma} \sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left[D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right]_{C^{\gamma}\left(Q_{3 R}^{\prime}\right)}+\sup _{k \in K_{+}}\left\|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\right\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{3 R}^{\prime}\right)}\right), \tag{6.1}
\end{equation*}
$$

one can show that

& \left|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{l}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)\right| \\
\leq & \kappa\left(\frac{\varphi_{l}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-\varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)}{R}\right)^{2 \mu} \quad\left(x^{\prime} \in Q_{2 r}, k, l \in K_{+}\right), \tag{6.2}
\end{align*}
$$

and

\left|D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(x^{\prime}\right)-D_{x^{\prime}} \varphi_{k}\left(y^{\prime}\right)\right| \leq \kappa\left(\frac{\left|x^{\prime}-y^{\prime}\right|}{R}\right)^{2 \mu} \quad\left(x^{\prime}, y^{\prime} \in Q_{2 r}^{\prime}, k \in K_{+}\right) \tag{6.3}

To prove the Hölder continuity of $U$ in Theorem 1.7, we use the following Campanato type embedding.

By comparing (6.2) and (6.3) with (5.71) and (5.72) respectively, we apply Lemma 5.10 and Lemma 5.12 respect to the point $z \in Q_{R}$ instead of the origin to find that for a sufficiently small universal constant $\varepsilon \in(0,1]$, if $\kappa\left(\frac{r}{R}\right)^{2 \mu} \leq \varepsilon$, then

& +\frac{c}{R^{2 \mu}}\left(\kappa f_{Q_{r}(z)}|U|^{2} d x+\kappa\|F\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{r}(z)\right)}^{2}+R^{2 \mu} \sup _{k \in K}[F]_{C^{\mu}\left(Q_{r}^{k}(z)\right)}^{2}\right)
\end{align*}

and

\leq & c\left[f_{Q_{r}(z)}|U|^{2} d x+\|F\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{r}(z)\right)}^{2}+R^{2 \mu} \sup _{k \in K}[F]_{C^{\mu}\left(Q_{r}^{k}(z)\right)}^{2}\right] \tag{6.5}
\end{align*}

for any $z \in Q_{R}$ and $0<\rho \leq r$. For the simplicity, set $\bar{\varepsilon}=\left(\kappa^{-1} \varepsilon\right)^{\frac{1}{2 \mu}}$ which is a universal constant.

If $\bar{\varepsilon} R<\rho \leq R$, then we have that $\bar{\varepsilon} R<\rho \leq r \leq R$. So (1.10) and (1.11) holds when $\bar{\varepsilon} R<\rho \leq R$. So suppose that $\rho \leq \bar{\varepsilon} R$.

If $0<\rho \leq r \leq \bar{\varepsilon} R$, then (1.10) and (1.11) hold from (6.4) and (6.5). So assume that $0<\rho \leq \bar{\varepsilon} R \leq r \leq R$. Then by (6.4) and (6.5),

& +\frac{c}{R^{2 \mu}}\left(\kappa f_{Q_{\bar{\varepsilon} R}(z)}|U|^{2} d x+\kappa\|F\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{\bar{\varepsilon} R}(z)\right)}^{2}+R^{2 \mu} \sup _{k \in K}[F]_{C^{\mu}\left(Q_{\bar{E} R}^{k}(z)\right)}^{2}\right)
\end{aligned}

and

\end{aligned}

So from that $\kappa$ and $\bar{\varepsilon}$ is universal, (1.10) and (1.11) hold when $0<\rho \leq \bar{\varepsilon} R \leq$ $r \leq R$.

Proof of Corollary 1.8. Let $u$ be a weak solution of

(6.6) $[U]_{C^{\mu}\left(Q_{R}\right)}^{2} \leq \frac{c}{R^{2 \mu}}\left(f_{Q_{2 R}}|U|^{2} d x+\|F\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{2 R}\right)}^{2}+R^{2 \mu} \sup _{k \in K}[F]_{C^{\mu}\left(Q_{2 R}^{k}\right)}^{2}\right)$,
and

\|U\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{R}\right)}^{2} \leq c\left(f_{Q_{2 R}}|U|^{2} d x+\|F\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{2 R}\right)}^{2}+R^{2 \mu} \sup _{k \in K}[F]_{C^{\mu}\left(Q_{2 R}^{k}\right)}^{2}\right) \tag{6.7}

By taking $\zeta=D u$, from Lemma 4.1 and Lemma 4.2, we have that

for any $x, y \in Q_{R}^{l}$ and $l \in K$. We have from Lemma 2.4 that $\pi \in C^{\mu}\left(Q_{2 R}\right)$ with the estimate that

for any $x, y \in Q_{R}^{l}$ and $l \in K$. So with (6.8), we find from (6.6) and (6.7) that

[D u]_{C^{\mu}\left(Q_{R}^{l}\right)}^{2} \leq \frac{c}{R^{2 \mu}}\left(f_{Q_{2 R}}|U|^{2} d x+\|F\|_{L^{\infty}\left(Q_{2 R}\right)}^{2}+R^{2 \mu} \sup _{k \in K}[F]_{C^{\mu}\left(Q_{2 R}^{k}\right)}^{2}\right)

for any $l \in K$. Since $|U| \leq c(|D u|+|F|)$ in $Q_{2 R}$, Corollary 1.8 holds.
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
